

## CTWCC Autumn 2025 Support Appeal



Clitheroe Town Wells Conservation Campaign (CTWWC) contacts you at a critical point in its Campaign 'to secure a lasting and meaningful future' for all three of Clitheroe's ancient and unique former Public Town Well sites. This to request local Community, Academic, and Amenity Organisation to simply acknowledge the significance of these three sites and request to encourage our elected Councillors do the same when the decision about their stewardship is made by them in the near future.

Significant progress towards this aim was achieved at the July 2025 Full Council meeting when a motion was unanimously approved to "...... to prepare a report for Community Committee on the appropriate route that this Council can take to acquire the ownership of the two remaining wells of Heild (sic) Well and St Mary's Well, to align their guardianship following the Council's 2019, successful, application for Stock Well."

Without a registered Title two of our three wells are condemned to unnecessary dilapidation. With registered Title for all three wells will enable the Council to work with CTWCC and the wider community - in partnership - to secure the necessary funding which will support a joint Municipal/Community based project. This will see all three sites fully surveyed, investigated, repaired in accord with best historic building conservation practices - and their social and historic significance fully interpreted and presented at each site. This will provide ensure sites will to be fully appreciated in future by this community – and the many beyond it who visit Clitheroe to appreciate its historic and unique importance within the County Palatine.

These are just some of the reasons why these sites are important:

- No town in England is known to have three ancient Wells so recognisable.
- Most of the existing stone enclosures date back to the reign of King Henry VIII.
- They are all natural 'Spring' wells and by research of into the origin of their existing or former names they are confirmed as having Anglo-Saxon origins.
- These sites are older than Clitheroe Castle. They were in continuous use for a thousand years or more until mains water came in 1854.
- Without a clean and reliable water supply the Anglo- Saxon 'Clyderhow' could not have developed into today's Clitheroe.
- They take an indigenous advantage of the special geological conditions that exist on Clitheroe's 'Limestone Reef Knoll' - the interface between porous upper and - impermeable lower - strata's.
- Historic England recognises their significance by their 'Grade II Listed' Building Status.
- Clitheroe's Conservation Area Assessment records them as 'most notable' for their 'distinct identity'.
- RVBC's Core Strategy confirms '...its Heritage Assets and their settings will be conserved and enhanced'
- With effective stewardship, all have great Heritage Tourist potential, akin to that in the Peak District where thousands flock annually to the *Well Dressing Festivals*.
- They are unique to Clitheroe, contributing to its status as one of Lancashire's finest historic towns.
- They inspirated Andy's Bowes' book, 'Reflections on the Water,' published in 2024 probably the best historical narrative of Clitheroe and available @ Clitheroe Library.
- All are, avoidably, deteriorating year on year. This can be arrested with the will to do so!
  STOP PRESS!
- Halloween themed 'Sprits of the Wells' broadsheets are now, temporarily, displayed at each site, promoting a mythical aspect for each site. Subject to weather we hoped to put on a short, repeated 'Open-air, Audio-Visual presentation' of this on All Hallows Eve. At Heald Well running between 6.00pm & 7.00pm.

CTWCC continues to promote and develop its '**Roadmap**' to secure a lasting and meaningful future for our three ancient former Public Town Wells. In pursuit of this aim, this appeal seeks your support to encourage our elected Councillors and our appointed Officers to:

- **a.** Accept their Municipal & Legal abilities to adopt Heald and St. Mary's Wells in a similar manner done for Stock Well in 2019 and apply to the Land Registry for 'title' over them, and
- **b.** Regard these ancient and unique sites as the 'Communal Assets' they have always been and not potential 'liabilities' which has been our Council's position to date.


